The fees for our School Direct programme are £9000. There are a range of **bursaries and scholarships**, up to £25,000, available to help cover those fees and living costs.

Do I meet the criteria?

As you'd imagine there are a number of boxes you must tick before you can start to train to become a teacher. Although the requirements differ slightly for primary and secondary teachers to be successful you'll need a variety of skills, formal and informal.

PRIMARY

Minimum of a grade C GCSE in maths, science and English, or equivalent

A degree with a 2:1 or a First

SECONDARY

Minimum of a grade C GCSE in maths and English, or equivalent,

A relevant degree with a 2:1 or a First

If you have a 2:2, and want to become a teacher, we are happy to accept an application if you have:

- a GCSE grade B or above in English language (please get in touch if you have a grade C).
- a GCSE grade C or above in mathematics and science.
- two A Levels at grade C or above.

References will be required in all cases, as will a well written personal statement which explains why you want to be a teacher and what you'd bring to the profession. And before you start any School Direct Training course with us you'll need to have passed your **Professional Skills Tests** and had some **experience of working in a classroom**. The Professional Skills Tests help ensure, regardless of the specialism, tomorrow's teachers have the core literacy and numeracy skills required. The tests are free and there is more information on passing the tests **available online**.

CASE STUDY

Emma Whelam-Tate School Direct - Primary

Why did you chose to train to be a primary teacher?

The school direct route into teaching provided me with a fantastic grounding for beginning my career as a teacher. Due to the carefully planned structure of the academic year, I gained a sound understanding of theory, subject knowledge and daily classroom practice. It was a great combination.

What did you find particularly valuable?

Working alongside experienced teachers was fantastic. The feedback from the weekly mentoring sessions ensured I could develop my professional skills. Because I trained in more than one school I was able to see how different schools work and how alternative approaches can be applied to teaching.

Reflecting back on my training year, I found this route into the teaching the best possible pathway for me.

What did you like most about the School Direct programme?

The balance between academic studies and classroom based practice worked for me. I'm now in my first year as a primary teacher and I feel confident and competent in my role.

How do I apply to PBTSA?

Once you're clear teaching is right for you the first step is to ensure you meet the **minimum criteria?**

You then need to ensure you understand the detail of the ITT programmes we offer. We run School Direct – Training courses in the **north east**. All our courses run from September to July with fees of

£9,000. There are a variety of financial packages available to trainee teachers to cover fees and living costs.

CASE STUDY

Andrew Mair School Direct -Secondary

Why did you chose to train to be a secondary teacher with PBTSA?

Summary
