Ian Ramsey CE Academy's English Department

The English Department at Ian Ramsey CE Academy is a passionate team with a wealth of experience. Comprised of 12 members of staff, including a HLTA, the department has a wealth of strengths within the staff. The team is led by the Director of English, supported by two TLR holders. Our priority is a consistency in approach that supports the needs of all pupils. As practitioners, we are keen to develop professionally, seeking new teaching ideas, training, and development opportunities. The team includes a variety of staff, from SLT to ECTs. It is a department who strive to support each other and build a curriculum that is robust and benefits all pupils.

All staff contribute towards curriculum development within the department, as well as take an active part in the day to day running of the subject. While the Director of English has overall leadership for all key stages, there are two seconds who lead on specific aspects of the curriculum. Teamwork and developing pedagogy within the classroom are at the heart of all we do and ensures that the English department continually strive to achieve the best for all.

English Curriculum

English forms part of the core curriculum for all pupils. Encompassing both English Language and English Literature in its syllabus, it the cornerstone of the school curriculum. As a curriculum area we aim to embed a love of learning for all pupils, and to cherish pupils' passions for the subject. All pupils are challenged and standards are exceptionally high. We foster a culture of high expectations and success in all regards, whilst being a main contributor to the school community and beyond. Learning lies at the very heart of our department and we work hard to ensure that pupils are well motivated in lessons and are achieving to the best of their ability. We encourage pupils to explore the subject and its wider impact within school and the further community; and embed a love of learning for all pupils.

The English curriculum is designed to spark a love of both English Language and English Literature in all pupils at all stages. Pupils are encouraged to take risks, to push their knowledge and understanding and to link their learning to the world outside of school. Every opportunity is taken to link skills, themes and learning to current issues affecting pupils and the wider cultural context.

Our spiral curriculum means key skills and concepts are introduced in Year 7 and revisited and built upon in subsequent years. Although we have ensured the curriculum meet the requirements of the National Curriculum, we also cover topics that are current to the lives and experiences of our pupils. Along with knowledge, opportunities to develop reading skills, questioning skills and critical thinking are fully embedded within lessons. All pupils at all stages are familiar with reciprocal reading strategies, with key stages built into all lessons.

Year 7 and 8 pupils have a fortnightly 'Reading for Pleasure' lesson in one of their timetabled English lessons. The lessons focus on the enjoyment of reading and utilise the reciprocal reading strategies which have been embedded in all subject areas across the academy.

The GCSE English Language and Literature courses follow the AQA specifications. In English Language we delve into the impact of writer's craft; the impact of language use; the impact of structural choices; writer's intent; and the impact of writer's choice. We also seek to support pupils' crafting of writing and their understanding of how to write for purpose and impact. There is also a unit focusing on Spoken Language which underpins writing for purpose whilst also addressing the NEA section of the AQA syllabus. For English Literature, the focus is on understanding writer's intent; judicious analysis of writer's choices; and the impact they have on the reader. Pupils are taught skills and structures which they use to support their analysis and the creation of their own work to ensure every pupil is equipped with the skills necessary to succeed.

Pupils are assessed every half term. Year 7-9 classes use the Life Without Levels system, while GCSE pupils are assessed using GCSE style questions and mark schemes. Assessments inform future planning for all staff to ensure that teaching supports the needs of all pupils.

Pupils are currently grouped by ability within Year 7-9, with 9 groups in each year group equally distributed across three bands. Year 7 and 8 also have a Nurture Group for our most vulnerable pupils who are taught English by our SENDCO, who is an English specialist. At GCSE, pupils are taught in groups according to targeted needs and loosely set on target grades.

Enrichment in English

English, working alongside the LRC has provided many opportunities for pupils to enjoy. Pupils have enjoyed activities including author and theatre visits; creative writing trips; poetry performances from world renowned poets including many from the GCSE poetry anthology. Staff are encouraged to support and deliver extra-curricular activities wherever possible with numerous theatre trips to engage and support pupils within and beyond our curriculum.

Timetable allocation

The timetable is based on a two-week schedule. Year 7-9 classes have seven hours a fortnight, and GCSE classes have eight hours a fortnight. Although both specifications are covered in full, pupils are not given designated English Language or English Literature lessons on their timetable. The curriculum coverage is set within the department.

Teaching rooms

The English Team is based primarily in seven classrooms on one corridor on the second floor of the building. There is an English workroom on the corridor. Each classroom has been recently decorated, and all have Plasma screens and whiteboards to support delivery of lessons. The Department is supported by the LRC (Learning Resource Centre) and we are lucky to have the support of a trained school librarian who is keen to assist both staff and pupils in any way possible. Every corridor in the school has a 'Little Library' to support the whole school Reading Strategy.

We very much look forward to welcoming you to the English department at Ian Ramsey CE Academy.
